

Lessons from the TOPS Pledge by Renee Sanford

The weight loss group TOPS (Take Off Pounds Sensibly) meets at our church each Monday at 8:00 a.m.



Every week we recite a pledge committing ourselves to remember to take off pounds sensibly. After all, that is why we joined and why we attend. It's our commitment to ourselves.

But on the first of each month we add another pledge – a pledge reminding us of our commitment not to ourselves but to our TOPS chapter. It goes like this:

I am an intelligent person – that is why I joined TOPS. I will control my emotions, and not let myself stay home because I might have gained. Every time I am tempted to find fault with my chapter, criticize my fellow members or think of quitting, I will remember:

my chapter can be no better than I help to make it. My fellow members need my help as much as I need theirs. And if I should quit TOPS, I might never reach my goal. Therefore, I hereby rededicate myself to support TOPS through my weight loss and my actions to the best of my ability.

Each time we read this together, it touches me and motivates me. And since we moved our meetings to our church library, I can't help but think – do I need this monthly reminder of my commitment to our fellowship as well? Sometimes I do.

I do need to control the emotions and the desires and lies which flutter through my mind on Sabbath morning or when there is church work to do. The sing-song that includes "I've had a rough week, I need some rest, I'm busy, someone else can do it. I'm not in the mood to be called to repentance or prayer or service or worship."

When I'm tempted to find fault with the church or criticize others, I need to remember:

- My church can be no better than I help to make it.
- My fellow church members need my help as much as I need theirs.
- If I should quit, I am likely to drift away in my relationship with Christ.

And, therefore, I need to rededicate myself to support my beloved church family.

It is so helpful to have a monthly reminder in TOPS of this commitment to my fellow weight-strugglers; and I've been silently adding the pledge of renewed commitment to my church family as well.

PRAYER FOCUS – APRIL 2019 Unreached People Groups by Renee Sanford

Really? Unreached people? Again?

Yes. Again. Because the need for prayer is urgent.

People. Over 2 billion people. Each one unique. Each one made in the image of God. Facing an eternity of darkness, misery, loneliness, without love, without God. People who can be born, live, and die without ever meeting a Christ follower. Without ever hearing the name of Jesus. Without the good news. Trapped in sin, without hope. We need to remember. We need to pray. People are unreached due to barriers of geography, language, culture, religion, politics, economics, and spiritual darkness. They will not hear the gospel unless someone reaches across these barriers to share it and demonstrate the love of Christ.

It is hard to grasp the enormity of 2 billion. This may help. Of these 2 billion unreached souls, 16 MILLION die each year. That is 2 people PER

SECOND. Dead. Forever. This should break our hearts and impel us to cry out to God for a mighty work of the Holy Spirit in preparing hearts to receive the good news and a mighty work of the Holy Spirit to send workers to go into the harvest fields.



An easy way to remember the major unreached people groups is **T-H-U-M-B**

- **T** is for **TRIBAL**, those who worship the spirits of nature or ancestors (90 million)
- **H** is for **HINDU**, with myriads of horrific gods (770 million)
- **U** is for **UN-RELIGIOUS**, the secular who deny that there is any god and place humanity on the throne (161 million in China)
- **M** is for **MUSLIM**, following allah, a capricious, impersonal, uncaring,

cruel god (1.2 billion)

• **B** is for **BUDDHIST**, seeking to eliminate desire so suffering will cease (300 million)

Pray for:

- Hearts to be drawn to God and responsive to Him
- God's word to be translated and the truth made available to people hungering for it
- Open doors for God's people to go to the unreached
- Calling, equipping and sending of God's people throughout the world
- Global migration moving unreached people to places where Christ-followers can minister to them and share the gospel
- Defeat of spiritual strongholds
- God's name the name of Jesus – to be glorified in praise and worship from all people

One of the things we learned about cross-cultural missions at the Cross Conference: Mission work is not necessarily exciting or glamorous. Sometimes it is simply living life; living life with the added difficulty of doing it away from friends and family, with limited financial resources, where you don't speak the language, and where you are constantly doing things "wrong" because vou don't know what is normal where you now live. You don't know how to find a doctor or a grocery store - if there even is such a thing. It's chronic frustration and hard work.

When I read between the lines on Nathaniel's service, this is often what I hear – he is working hard and there are times when it's tough to cope. Here's his brief e-mail this week:

You ask how's it going with me?! Sorry I've been a bit quiet the past couple

months, the busyness doesn't stop! (smile) Right now I'm still waiting on my visa, so that's been a long process of waiting and trying not to worry. But I still haven't been kicked out (haha), so that's a blessing but just a lot of waiting. We're in the process of properly launching our skate *ministry under the name Run* Skateboard Co. So that's pretty exciting! It's been a dream the Lord has been putting on my heart for a while now. I've been really good at pushing it off up until a month ago and now we're chasing it. It's still a non-profit concept, but the goal is to use it as a way to build relationships and share Jesus in a subtle but also intentional way in Germany but also around Europe. Having skate products and stuff like that that can create a platform.

We're doing a demo at a large Christian youth festival, I'm really excited about that. It will be a great way to impact the youth and raise awareness for skate ministry here.

The rest of the time has been a lot of graphic design projects and networking stuff and the YWAM cafe so that's been a bit of where I'm at.

Memorable Moments from CROSS by Linda Lyke

For those of us who went to CROSS Conference, the young adult missions conference in January, the impact is lasting. Each month I'll share a few memorable quotes from various speakers:

- If you took every Christian currently alive in the world and every single Christian on the planet shared the Gospel with every non-Christian they currently know, there would still be 3 billion or more lost people. They do not know any Christian to tell them the good news of Jesus Christ.
- The numbers and the need are absolutely overwhelming for us in our human strength but let us move forward with the unquenchable, indefatigable assurance that the knowledge of the glory of God will cover the earth as the waters cover the seas.
- What will it take for the concept of unreached people to be intolerable to us?
- We want this generation to take hold of the Great Commission and move out into the world.

Pursuing Holiness by Micah Crandall

From January 2nd-5th a group of us from the area surrounding the Milton SDB Church went to the Cross Missions Conference. The conference exists to equip a generation to lay down their lives in pursuit of the Glory of Jesus Christ, and that's what it did. I came away from the conference with a strong internal urge to pursue Holiness. Holiness is something that is often neglected by people my age. In fact Kevin DeYoung, one of the speakers at Cross, actually described us as being allergic to Holiness. Being Holy is to be set apart from what is common; to be different or unique in comparison to this world. Working with this definition, it is easy to see why such a thing that is constantly talked about in Scripture has often been neglected because being different can be utterly terrifying for most people. Yet this is what it is to be Holy, someone set apart from the world in how they live, speak, act, think, and view the world around them. This is a high calling, but as Christians we are called to be Holy as God

is Holy. "As obedient children, do not be conformed to the passions of your former ignorance, but as he who called you is holy, you also be holy in all your conduct, since it is written, "You shall be holy, for I am holy." 1 Peter 1:14-16

What does God's Holiness look like? If we are to be Holy like God, what are we striving to be like? God's Holiness is hard to describe. As imperfect beings it's hard to fathom perfection, but you can think of it as somewhat like the sun. It is unique, at least in our solar system, it is powerful, and it is the source of life. You can go even further and say that like the area around the sun is hot, the area surrounding God's presence is also Holy. Like the sun is a good thing, so is the Holiness of God. But if you get too close to the sun, you will burn up and the same is true of God's Holiness. Because we are sinful beings, impure and unholy, we cannot stand in His presence. Not because His Holiness is bad but because it

is that good. In order to be near to God, we need to become Holy, but that is a process we cannot undertake on our own. This is why we need Christ. When He died on the cross He took our unholiness upon Himself and imputed His Holiness onto us.

Becoming Holy is not something that we can avoid as maturing Christians, and pursuing Holiness further is essential for Christian growth and mission work. Mission work is incredibly hard, and not for the spiritually weak. You will face persecution, spiritual warfare, loneliness, sickness, strain with your teammates, and so much more. If you're not spiritually mature, you will fall and fall hard. The best way to grow as a Christian is through a commitment to pursuing Holiness in all areas of your life. Make no mistake, this is a battle for purity of mind, heart, and body. It is the battle against

Chronic Pain by Barb Green, Parish Nurse

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recently reported that 50 million Americans suffer from chronic pain. An additional 20 million experience severe pain that limits their normal movement and activities.

All of us experience pain at some time in our lives. For most, the pain lingers for a short while and then is gone and forgotten. Others suffer from pain that is ongoing and leads nowhere. Labor pain results in a baby; exercise pain leads to fitness and health. Chronic pain has no end goal; sufferers struggle to see God at work behind the endless pain.

Chronic suffering is like white noise, always on in the background of your life. Many times it is invisible and those who suffer do so silently. Chronic pain hurts, not just because of the physical sensations, but because of other things that tag along: insomnia, depression, anxiety, social isolation and misinterpretations on the part of others. These problems are difficult to communicate.

Sufferers wonder about calling their pain "chronic". If they do are they giving up on the possibility of getting better? Should they keep asking for prayer over and over for the same thing? Will they be one of those people whose names show up regularly in the church bulletin among the sick and suffering? Most of all they want to live a normal life.

In addition to the physical or

mental pain, chronic pain takes a toll on relationships and on a person's sense of self. There may also be deep spiritual pain. Where is God when we don't experience healing? Has He abandoned us? Has the church forgotten us?

One difficulty with chronic pain is that other people instinctively want to offer solutions even when the person isn't asking for them. They don't want to just listen and really hear the story with no agenda beyond being an attentive listener and practicing the ministry of presence. False ideas about chronic pain interfere with people's ability to listen gracefully. These include:

ALL PAIN IS FIXABLE......
You just need to keep looking for a cure. The fact is that chronic pain is often not curable. The cause may be known but the treatment may cause new problems. Insisting that there has to be a reason and asking questions such as: Are you harboring unforgiveness? or what is God punishing you for? are certainly not helpful.

TRADITIONAL MEDICINE
AND DOCTORS ARE JUST

These may indeed be helpful but the person who is
suffering is the expert on
what they have tried and


I DON'T BELIEVE IN TAKING MEDICATIONS...they are dangerous. This makes the person feel as if their treatment choices are unorthodox, a matter of wrong beliefs. Often they are only able to function because of medications prescribed. DEPENDENCE AND LIMITA-TIONS ARE PROBLEMS... It is best to overcome them and be independent. The Bible reminds us that we all are dependent on God's provision and that we flourish best when we help each other. For many with chronic pain, learning to accept and accommodate their dependence (on others for help, on assistive devices, on medications) and limitations is a necessary step in crafting fulfilling lives in spite of

The Bible has a lot to say about pain and weakness, and therefore a lot to say to those who are in pain. There is power in weakness. Embracing our Godgiven interdependence and human limitations helps us discover the abundant life God intends for us. Those in chronic pain need to be supported for the hard work they do to live satisfying lives with pain. They need the continued help and support of family, friends and the church. They need to be accepted, not as a person who is ill, but as a child of God. Next month's article will talk about specific ways this can be done.
