

their behavior – praying, singing and praising God in the face of hardship – was observed by both their jailers and other prisoners. They were able to share the gospel with their captors in an opportune moment, and the jailer and his family came to believe, as well (Acts 16:34). Based on material from Open Doors

How to Pray for Persecuted Christians Prayer Focus for December by Renee Sanford, Prayer Coordinator

Our prayer focus for December is persecuted Christians.

When we read headlines about people being persecuted for their faith, it seems like there's nothing we can do. We live thousands of miles away. We feel over-extended in managing our own families and responsibilities. Nevertheless, our hearts yearn to ease the hardship of Christians who are discriminated against, harassed, unjustly arrested, beaten, imprisoned or even killed by governments or local leaders who oppose Jesus Christ.

Fortunately, the Bible provides practical insight on how to help persecuted believers through prayer. The prayers of a righteous person accomplish much – and we are righteous through Jesus. So we can help. How should we pray?

1. Pray that in every circumstance, God will give persecuted Christians the right words.

In Ephesians 6:19-20, Paul asks fellow believers to "Pray also for me, that whenever I open my mouth, words may be given me so that I will fearlessly make known the mystery of the gospel, for which I am an ambassador in chains. Pray that I may declare it fearlessly, as I should."



2. Pray that persecuted Christians, whatever their weak-

nesses, will understand and find peace in the sufficiency of God's grace.

Christians may be put into scenarios where they must make instantaneous choices under great pressure. For this reason, we pray for them to understand the promises of 2 Corinthians 12:9 which says, "'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.' Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me."

3. Pray that Christians facing hardship will draw from a source of power larger than themselves.

Persecuted Christians often have very little control over their lives, including their own (and their family's) safety and health. They often don't receive a fair trial or representation. They may lose jobs or custody of their children. It's critical to pray for them to see, like Paul, that their hardship helps them rely on a God who is far more powerful than them. "For we were so utterly burdened beyond out strength that we despaired of life itself. Indeed, we felt that we had received the sentence of death." Paul said in 2 Corinthians 1: 7-9, "But that was to make us rely not on ourselves but on

God who raises the dead."

4. Pray that God would be present with persecuted Christians in their hardship, protecting them according to His will.

In Matthew 26:39, Jesus Himself faced an unjust trial. He prayed, "My Father, if it is possible let this cup pass from me," which is the first part of his prayer that inspires us to ask God to deliver persecuted Christians from harm. At the same time, the second part of Jesus' prayer goes hand-inhand with praying this request. "Yet not my will, but yours be done." Part of our praver can be that God will deliver Christians from chains, as he did for Peter in Acts 12. But we also pray that if God does not see fit to supernaturally intervene in such a way, that He will intervene to strengthen these believers no matter the outcome.

5. Pray that their witness would inspire those who seek to harm them.

In Luke 6:27-31, Jesus said, "But I say to you who hear, love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you." When Christians can maintain perspective like this, their actions are often noticed by those who persecute them. In the case of Paul and Silas, in Acts 16:25,

Highlights of Christian Persecution in 2019

1. The ongoing reality of targeted persecution against women. In 2019, Open Doors Ministry reported shocking details about the persecution experienced by Christian women. In many places, they experience a "double persecution" one for being a Christian and one for being a woman. Gender -specific persecution (including rape or forced marriages) is a key means of destroying the minority Christian community. This kind of persecution is difficult to assess because it is complex, violent and hidden. In many cultures where women are specifically targeted, it is difficult if not impossible to report accurate numbers.

2. Islamic oppression continues to impact millions of

Christians. In 7 out of the top 10 of the most dangerous countries for Christians (see list below), the primary cause of persecution is Islamic oppression. This means, for millions of Christians - particularly those who grew up Muslim or were born into Muslim families - openly following Jesus can have painful consequences. They can be treated as second-class citizens, discriminated against for jobs or violently attacked.

3. The world's two most highly populated countries show increased persecution

of Christians. For the first time, India is part of the worst 10 countries. And things in China got worse in the last year - China moved from 43rd

worst to 27th. Each of these countries is home to more than a billion people, so these trends are distressing. Hindu nationalists in India continue to attack Christians with no apparent consequences. In China, the increased power of the government and the rule of Xi Jinping make open worship difficult and dangerous.

4. The spread of radical Islam across sub-Saharan Afri-

ca. While the violent excesses of ISIS and other Islamic militants have mostly disappeared from headlines from the Middle East, these losses have moved many advocates to other regions, particularly into sub-Saharan Africa. Their radical ideology has inspired, or infiltrated, numerous splinter

groups such as Islamic State West Africa Province, a deadly group that broke away from Nigeria's Boko Haram. These groups kidnap and enslave Christian women and girls as an integral part of their strategy.

5. More laws have been passed to control religion.

State authoritarianism is increasing in many parts of the world, supported by the everspreading availability of personal digital technology, which governments can increasingly track through facial recognition, electronic chips and so on. Places like Vietnam, Myanmar, China and North Korea all saw increases in stricter state control of religious rights.

Reducing Your Risk of Breast Cancer by Barb Green, Parish Nurse

Although there has been decades of progress in improved diagnostics, better treatments, deeper under-

standing of genetic risks and stronger support networks, breast cancer remains the most common cancer in women. Even more alarming, the overall incidence of breast cancer is projected to double globally by 2040 and occur more frequently in younger women. Efforts need to be focused on finding ways to reduce this risk by providing education about established lifestyle risk factors, as well as environmental hazards that may increase the odds of developing breast cancer.

Women's breasts are more vulnerable to cancer than other organs because of the unique ways they are built and function. Breast development has two main phases: in the womb and during adolescence. Both are extra sensitive to lifestyle and environmental factors. In contrast, other organs form in the womb and are ready to function after birth .Breasts may be more vulnerable to cancer because they take longer to develop.

A breast cancer risk factor is anything that increases the odds of developing breast cancer, such as having an inherited genetic mutation, taking extra hormone medications or being exposed to particular



chemicals. An inherited gene does not cause cancer by itself, it only increases the risk. The gene mutations, BRCA1 and BRCA2, are respon-

sible for less than 10% of all breast cancer cases.

Major differences between modern life and life 50 years ago help explain why breast cancer is more common today. Some of these realities are listed below:

- Women are living an average of 30 years longer than a century ago. Aging is the biggest risk factor for breast cancer.
- Puberty and breast development are starting earlier. The younger a girl is when she gets her first period, the higher her risk for breast cancer later in life.
- Delayed pregnancy- A woman's first full-term pregnancy protects against breast cancer by making breast cells mature. Mature cells are more likely to grow normally and be less likely to become

abnormal, giving rise to cancer.

 Increased use of prescription hormones-Hormone replacement ther-

> apy and birth control pills produce a small to moderate increase in risk. The longer

these medicines are taken, the higher the risk.

- Obesity is an epidemic of modern life and an established breast cancer risk factor. Overeating increases body fat and promotes food cravings, leading to more eating. Fat cells make estrogen and the extra fat makes extra estrogen
- Physical inactivity. Regular exercise helps lower the risk of breast cancer by managing weight and limiting food cravings. It helps regulate hormone and blood sugar levels that can trigger extra cell activity.
- Increase in alcohol consumption which can both interfere with the breakdown of estrogen and increase its production.
- Smoking causes double trouble by causing cell damage and by impairing the healing process. Unhealthy, cancer-causing chemicals from smoke go to all parts of the body.
- Low Vitamin D levels. Vitamin D helps regulate normal breast cell growth.
- Stress and sleep deprivation- Both can lead to high blood levels of cortisone which can have a negative effect on our immune system's ability to function properly and protect our cells from injury.
- Environmental pollutants-The widespread use of synthetic chemicals in modern

life has changed the chemical makeup of the environments inside and outside our bodies. Some directly damage our genes; others can mimic estrogen or disrupt the normal hormonal balance and lead to abnormal breast cell growth. Rereading this list of breast cancer risk factors can give you ideas about what you can do to lower your personal risk. Change is a journey. You must start somewhere. Whether it's making the choice to avoid plastics or rethinking your food choices, start now and try your best. More detailed information can be found at breastcancer.org


