A COVID - 19 Moment: The blessing of partnership with our SDB Conference

In a moment the world was turned upside down. I remember the week when things shifted for me. On Wednesday, March 11th I was listening to a college professor announce that he was cancelling in person classes for the rest of the semester and going to online instruction. It was unreal and shocking to me that cancelling in person classes was being talked about, but it quickly woke me up to the fact that we were not in Kansas anymore.

It was then that we began to respond to this ever-changing situation with communication to the church for that Sabbath, March 14th, and what turned out to be our last in person worship service until June 13th when we met together in an outdoor worship service at Camp Wakonda. Since that coming week was our spring break week, we had the time to get our act together as far as the shift to online ministry was concerned.

My experience with online video communication had not been very positive up until that point. However, I heard that a youth group in our local area had met online on Sunday, March 15th using Zoom, so I decided to check it out.

I was so impressed that almost immediately I paid for a year's subscription and began to plan for

our ministries, small groups and Bible studies to begin using it. We had enough overlap of



groups wanting to use the licensed version (which was available for an unlimited amount of time instead of the 40 minute limit on the unlicensed version) that we purchased a second license to accommodate all the groups.

Now three months later with things beginning to open back up, we are still using both licenses nearly every day. We anticipate that some of our groups will continue to use Zoom and will not gather in person going forward. Others will meet in person and will use Zoom to accommodate those who live from a distance. Upon reflection, our ministries really did not skip a beat. However, we did have lots of technical problems to solve along the way which always made life fun and interesting.

Meanwhile on another ministry front, we had been talking about doing livestream for Sabbath worship gatherings for several years, but it had never reached the point where the cost to get it up and running was able to fit our budget. When everything went online, we once again took up the conversation, and it became clear to me and to our technical director, Matt Uglum, that livestream was no longer an option but rather a necessity. This led to some creative solutions that allowed us to not need the large dollar amounts of buying three SEVENTH DAY

Instead we were able to retrofit our existing camera system (which by the way was purchased with help from a grant from the Conference, thank you VERY much Conference people!) so that as we gather again for worship in the church sanctuary we are able to do a livestream. When money allows we will upgrade our

cameras.

cameras, but for the moment we are able to do what we need to do.

With the reality of this moment requiring that a good percentage of our people will stay at home, the livestream is definitely a necessity for ministry. As other churches have seen, we also have expanded our online reach during this time, and so livestreaming will be an added vehicle to those who have joined us and will pass on our ministry to those they know.

encouraging to be supported by those SDB leaders who have a heart and a vision for the gospel to advance through the local church.

I am also encouraged by the adaptability and commitment to the Lord which I have seen in our people here in Milton. This wave of change could have knocked us flat, but we have risen to the challenge. I also believe that we will see the impact of this shift in ministry in powerful ways in the time to come.

As I reflect on what God is doing during this unprecedented time, there is at least one thing that stands out to me. We have learned that we need each other. Thank you Conference leadership for recognizing that we needed to connect in a different way during this season and being willing to help! Thank you Milton SDBers for shifting gears and being the family of God in these rapidly changing times!



Our thanks to the General Conference for the Church Revitalization Grant which has helped support our shift to online ministry. I am grateful for their proactive response and support. I believe that in the days ahead we will need this skill of quickly responding to rapidly changing ministry needs more than ever. It is

World on Mission

In "World on Mission," I'll share in each newsletter what I learned in the Perspectives on the World Christian Movement class – because God calls ALL of us to have a part in His movement. What a wonderful, awesome thing, that God allows and desires us to have a part in His plan.

Our Perspectives Study Guide Lesson 1 states that God's ultimate purpose is that He be glorified. The book of Revelation tells us that when Jesus returns, that there WILL be people from every nation/people group in the world worshiping him. Our Perspectives course explains it this way:

"God is on mission to be loved, served and worshiped by people from all humanity." (Perspectives Study Guide - PSG, page 4) The Guide continues, "God's purpose is a singular purpose with three distinct directions: toward God, for people, and against evil," with an explanation of those three.

- 1. Toward God: God desires that worship will come to Him from every nation. Therefore, world evangelization is ultimately for God.
- 2. For People: God intends to bring redemptive blessing to every people. He will redeem a people from every people group. (simple explanation of redemption: deliverance of Christians from sin)
- 3. Against Evil: God will overcome evil powers in order to liberate people and ultimately to bring all things under His everlasting and complete governance. This kingdom reign is the substance of the blessing He brings to the nations.

Here is the Perspectives simple summary of God's purpose:

 For His glory in global worshiping, God purposes to overcome evil by redeeming a people who will love and obey Him within every people.

So my challenge to you is to pray, asking God what your part is in bringing glory to Him.

And also pray about what is your part in the Great Commission:

Matt 28:19-20a Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you.

Summer Service Opportunity - One Apple Lunch Bunch

There have been people struggling with hunger for thousands of years. This result of our fallen, broken world is heavy on God's heart. How does one know this? A quick Google search of Bible verses related to feeding the hungry brought up over 100 biblical references. These references are found throughout both the Old and New Testaments. It doesn't take a lot of study to find out God's expectations for how Christians are to respond to those in need in our world. Perhaps one of Jesus' most well-known teachings on this topic can be found in Matthew 25:35 as he was describing the scene at His throne in heaven and who would inherit the kingdom. "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me."

Jesus then qualified this comment in verse 40 when he said, "Truly I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me." As Christ followers, God expects us to help take care of the hungry in our community and world.

Once again this summer, our church has an easy way for many of us to take part in feeding the hungry in our community with the One Apple Lunch Bunch program. Summer can be a particularly hard time for children and families who face food short-

age difficulties. Families rely on the free or reduced breakfast and lunch programs offered in our public schools to help offset their grocery needs. The One Apple Lunch Bunch is in its 3rd year of

providing free lunches throughout the summer for the children in our community. This program is administered by the Milton United Methodist Church and is supported by individuals, businesses, and nonprofits in Milton by both financial contributions and volunteers to make and serve these important meals.

The Milton Seventh Day Baptist Church and Awana Clubs will be providing the volunteers Aug. 3 - 6th to prepare and pack these lunches from 9:30-10:45 at the Milton United Methodist Church. Volunteers will be provided

Volunteers will be provided with gloves and hand sanitizer. They ask that you bring your own face covering to prepare and serve lunches. The church will be set up so there will be an acceptable distance between volunteers. We will be preparing simple sandwiches and packing other prepackaged food in the bags. Volunteers need to be at least 15 years old to

make the sandwiches. Younger volunteers may assist in packing the prepackaged food items in the bags.

Volunteers are also needed this week to help hand out lunches at Harmony Elementary School on Mon. and Wed. and at the United Methodist Church on Tues. and Thurs. from

Our Immune System by Barb Green, Parish Nurse

The immune system is a complex network of cells and proteins that defends the body against infection. It keeps a record of every germ it has ever defeated so it can recognize and destroy it quickly if it enters the body again. The main parts of this system are white blood cells, antibodies, the complement system, the lymphatic system, the spleen, the thymus and the bone marrow.

White blood cells are the key players. Made in the bone marrow they move through blood and tissue throughout the body looking for bacteria, viruses, parasites and fungi. When they find them, they launch an attack. B cells make antibodies to fight infections. T cells include those that fight viruses, memory cells which remember past viruses and give immunity and naïve cells which teach themselves to fight new viruses, such as COVID-19.


Antibodies help fight microbes or the toxins they produce by recognizing them on cells and marking them for destruction. The complement system includes proteins whose actions complement the work done by antibodies. The lymphatic system helps bathe the body's tissues with infection-fighting white cells. The spleen removes microbes and destroys old or damaged red blood cells. Bone marrow produces red blood cells, white blood cells and platelets. The thymus filters your blood content and produces T-lymphocytes. This is a

very basic explanation of the immune system.

With the advent of COVID -19, studying

the immune system has become a focus of researchers. There are no memory cells because no one has ever seen this virus. It is understood that the immune system functions less efficiently as people age and that genetics plays a role. But is there something else that makes some of us more immune than others? Why do 50-year olds die from this virus while some people in their 90's survive? There are no blood tests to measure B and T cells and even if there were, no one knows what a healthy amount is.

Immunologists do know that not everyone's immune system declines in the same way. Aging decreases the number of immune cells. Part of the reason for this is rising inflammation levels as we age. Inflammation helps the body fight disease and is meant to be short term. Sometimes it gets turned on and never goes off causing chronic inflammation with all the problems it causes. This chronic inflammation is silent, producing no symptoms so your immune system may be compromised and you don't know it.



What can we do to strengthen our immune system? We can't change our genetic makeup but many factors that positively affect the immune system **are** within our control. These

include: movement (skeletal muscle is a major immune regulatory organ), weight management, self-knowledge (knowing your numbers such as airflow capacity if you have respiratory problems), nutrition (vegetables, good proteins and fiber), calm (unregulated stress can accelerate the rate of cell decline), vaccines (get whatever your doctor recommends based on your age and medical conditions) and medications (corticosteroids and some other medications can raise your risk of some infections.) Talk to your doctor about possible immune system side effects and how to address them.

Take these immune system boosters seriously. We may not be able to stop our cells from aging but any slowdown produced means a higher immune reserve at any given time. This may help the incidence of disease and certainly affects the severity. In these times of novel viruses like COVID-19 this could save your life.
