Due to the nature of needing to maintain physical distance and the fact that meeting in homes and at the church was not possible, Camp has become the defacto youth center.

On Monday and Tuesday nights, Koinonia Youth Ministries has been meeting every week at camp. In addition, they were able to use Camp for Koinonia Singers rehearsals and an outdoor presentation at the beginning of their tour. Our youth ministry, Collision Student Ministry, has been meeting every week on Wednesday nights. Because of COVID, we decided to continue to meet throughout the summer, and it has been absolutely wonderful. Our core group of students was faithful, and the Lord has been

moving in awesome ways in hearts. On Thursdays we started The Wild Man Club, and it was an absolute blast! Between 5 and 10 teens came out weekly for a couple of months and cleared trails, played in the creek, and were greatly encouraged to be with others. Beyond those gatherings, there were many bonfires and game nights involving various teens.

As I told the youth at The Wild Man Club, the Lord gave us Camp Wakonda so that we could enjoy it and so that we could enjoy Him! This year has been an exclamation point on that truth. All that we do at Camp is to point kids and adults to Jesus, and this has not stopped one bit during the pandemic. In fact, the pandemic has only shown us that the Lord wants to keep using Camp for His glory as much as possible. So I say, let's keep it going!



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## Camp Wakonda Summer Intern: Bethany Crandall



One of our Camp and Leadership Development goals for 2020 was to develop and implement a Camp Director in Training program. Our approach was to be a combination of leadership training and onthe-job training. With the quarantine we had to adjust our plans. Bethany shifted from Director-in-Training to summer camp intern. Her work was to update, organize and create new ways of making camp better for next year and the years to come.

Some of the projects Bethany tackled were to update the job descriptions for our camp

board and camp staff, to update our staff applications and our camp director's manual, to update our master calendar checklist and to divide up responsibilities according to updated job descriptions, and to create new staff training videos and a new camp brochure. Her work was tremendous and will provide some much needed groundwork as we adjust to the changing realities of our camping ministry.

## **CW Property Improvements and Maintenance**

This year has seen a major improvement in clearing back the growth of the woods along the edges of the mowed areas of camp. The goal is to clear 20 feet back from the edge to make it look better and to help cut down on the presence of mosquitos. Many thanks to Gary Groelle who has spent much time clearing the perimeter!

The old culvert along the curve on the east driveway was replaced this summer. It fell into disrepair from the garbage trucks which would cut the corner on the curve and put too much pressure on it. Joe Michel, Brandon Crandall and Gary worked to put in a new culvert. In addition, posts have been placed to mark the inside of the curve so that the garbage trucks won't ruin the new culvert! That's wise thinking guys!



Other miscellaneous work at camp includes the following: The gravel path between the lodge and the boys dorm was refurbished. This involved raising it up so that water wouldn't gather at a low spot along the path. New mulch was put down at the swings. Two oak trees near the lodge were cut down, and the ditch made from removing the trees was repaired. A problem with water getting into the kitchen has been addressed which involved moving a Gas line and digging out the area outside the kitchen fan. This winter the inside of the lodge will be painted.

All of this work makes it possible to lead kids to know and grow in the Lord. Thanks to Brandon and everyone else who makes Camp Wakonda ready to be used in the service of our Lord Jesus Christ!

we are in a healthy place financially. Our Property Improvement Fund stands at


\$10,892.45, and our Camp Wakonda Investment Fund is \$3,716.

konda, please reach out to Pastor Nate. He will tell you that it's more than worth it!!





### Prayer Focus - Thanksgiving by Renee Sanford, Prayer Coordinator

I've found it a challenge to be thankful in the current situation. It takes discipline each day to remember to con-



sciously thank God. This graphic (based on a poster from the Pilgrim Hall Museum in Plymouth, Massachusetts) really helped me. It shows how many of the people who arrived on the Mayflower did not survive until the first Thanksgiving. Look at the devastation. And yet, they focused on thanksgiving. Not that they did not grieve - but that they CHOSE to focus on giving thanks. Not forgetting their problems, but holding fast to what they knew of God's character.

What a testimony to their commitment to God's word in 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 – Rejoice always, pray continually, **give thanks** in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus.

May we be as faithful – to lift our voices in praise and thanksgiving despite the difficulties we are facing.

We have an incredible heritage of people enduring great hardship while remaining true to God.

In 1876 Daniel Roberts, an Episcopal priest who had served in the Ohio infantry during the Civil War, wrote the hymn "God of Our Fathers" to celebrate 100 years since the Declaration of Independence. Sixteen years later it was chosen by the church as the best hymn to celebrate 100 years of constitutional law.

These are the words to that hymn:

God of our Fathers, Whose Almighty Hand Leads forth in beauty all the starry band. Of Shining worlds in splendor through the skies **Our grateful songs**, before thy throne arise.

Thy Love divine hath led us in the past. In this free land by thee our lot is cast. Be thou our ruler, guardian, guide, and stay. Thy Word Our Law, thy Paths our chosen ways. From wars alarms, **from deadly pestilence**, Be thy Strong arm our ever sure defense; Thy true religion in our hearts increase, Thy Bounteous goodness, nourish us in peace.

**Refresh thy people** on their toilsome way; Lead us from night, to never ending day; Fill all our lives, with love and grace divine, And glory, laud, and praise be ever thine.

His stirring words are fitting for us at this time. God is our ruler, guardian, guide and stay. His paths are our chosen ways. He is our sure defense from deadly pestilence. May our grateful songs arise before His throne. LORD, may we, like the pilgrim people, choose to focus on all we have to be thankful for – especially for the love you showed us in the sacrifice of Jesus for our salvation.

Give the Gospels a fresh look and notice how intentional Jesus was with individuals he encountered. In fact, he developed a reputation for spending time with outsiders. Preaching and proclamation were significant in his ministry, yet he spent the vast majority of his time on the road with twelve men who were

slowly coming to understand who Jesus was. They were taught, but they also caught how Jesus made disciples.

They learned from him how to engage spiritual seekers and walk with them on the discipleship journey. So can Christians in the 21st century. So can churches. So can you.

THE 9 ARTS OF SPIRITUAL CONVERSATIONS

You can think of the nine arts in groups of three:

- **1. Getting Ready**: Noticing,\* Praying, Listening
- **2. Getting Started**: Asking Questions, Loving, Welcoming
- **3. Keeping It Going**: Facilitating, Serving Together, Sharing

#### Featuring The Art of Noticing by Shanny Snyder

Noticing. Noticing is one of the 9 Spiritual Arts that Melissa Lade, Linda Lyke and I are leading as a Grow Group this Fall/Winter. Noticing is one of the very first steps in caring for other people and extending the light of Jesus Christ to them. It can sound easy to notice something unique about a person, sure. Simple. But to actually go and verbalize to a stranger that you like their hair and to somehow manage to tie in the gospel in the same short visit can be a much more intimidating feat than you'd be willing to undergo on a Tuesday evening trip to the grocery store.

Here's how I did it. I went to one of my top five stores, Ulta, once it reopened again this late Summer. I went straight for my favorite product and fondly remembered the smell of new perfume amongst fresh makeup and squinted pleasantly under the tinge of the store's florescent lights. I noticed a sales worker dressed in all black floating about the isles and I, eager to try out my dusty people skills, flagged her down and struck up a fun conversation with her. She was roughly 60 years of age which was different from the typical 20 year olds I've seen many times earlier in her position. I complimented her on her foundation choice and warm toned eye shadow and we got to gabbing.

God did what he does best and by the work of the Holy Spirit we both shared how we can pray for one another. During that time, the forest fires in California were reaching what they'd call a peak and she told me that she's nervous for her daughter's safety who lives in that area. After exchanging prayer requests, we parted ways feeling lighter and more peaceful from the beginning of our girl talk that moved naturally into God talk. I'm unsure if she is a believer but God can deal with that part. He told me to minister and to pray for her so I did. I started that obedience trek with the verb noticing.

I'd like to end this short article with a phrase from the 9 Arts of Spiritual Conversations. "Noticing is a prerequisite to caring about others and serving them in tangible ways that smuggle the gospel into their hearts."- Doug Pallock

Lastly, brothers and sisters, be brave. God has us right where he wants us. Let's move forward to advancing the kingdom and as bold as lions. We start that with noticing, noticing what God is speaking to us and noticing other people.

A week later, the child returned to class, still very joyful and the teacher asked how sharing Jesus went. The little girl said, "My family doesn't love Jesus." The teacher was surprised that she was still so joyful but then the child said, "so I went out in the street to the shops and people asked questions!" The little girl's mother did accept Jesus and later the father did too. The extended family came to talk them out of it, and instead ended up giving their hearts to Christ as well. All in all, 50 extended family members have come to faith and they started a church. Hallelujah!

#### World on Mission

In "World on Mission" each month I share a bit about what we learned in the Perspectives on the World Christian Movement class – because God calls ALL of us to have a part in his mission. What is his mission?

"God is on mission to be loved, served and worshiped by people from all humanity." (Perspectives Study Guide - PSG, pg. 4)

This month, I feature Samaritan's Purse as a real life example of our Perspectives on World Missions course in action!

With the Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Project, Samaritan's Purse is reaching out in hard to reach places:

Unreached people groups are considered unreached with the Gospel if less than 2% of their overall population professes a belief in Jesus Christ. To reach these groups, Samaritan's Purse is partnering with Seed Company, an affiliate of Wycliffe Bible Translators, to translate Bible stories and Samaritan's Purse discipleship materials into dozens of languages where God's Word isn't known. Many of these are in oral-based cultures, where they are sharing the Gospel through solar-powered MP3 players.



Did you know that every shoebox gift is an excellent resource for evangelism and discipleship, which leads to the multiplication of new believers and churches around the world? Local Christians share the Gospel, inviting children to trust in Jesus. With this approach, local Christians who know the culture and language best are given effective resources and a solid Biblical foundation so that they can communicate the Gospel within their own communities.

Take in what our Perspectives Reader describes as being "lost." (pg. 29)

"Jesus saw the crowds of people surging about Him as sheep without a shepherd, helpless and hopeless, and He was deeply moved. Worse than being trapped and not knowing the way out is to be lost and not even know it, for then one does not look for salvation, recognize it when it comes, nor accept it when it is offered. That's being lost."

Our Perspectives Study
Guide describes a successful model of reproducing churches (pg. 153,
George Patterson):

The most successful church planters avoid public preaching of the gospel themselves. They work from the very earliest stage to train and to coach local leaders to communicate the gospel, primarily by way of family ties in small home settings rather than formal preaching venues. New churches are formed in the simplest of ways so that the people can see the church being born from the essence of the community.

So with the Operation Christmas Child project, boys and girls who may not realize they are lost without Jesus, have the opportunity to hear. They have ears, so OCC lets them hear! What exciting news, that OCC is reaching out in areas where they don't know Jesus' name. Plus in discipling local believers who best know the culture and language, they are able to share the OCC discipleship program with the children and their families.

# New Church Supported Missionary: Jan Teat, Q Place

Introducing Jan Teat, a new missionary of our church. Jan has supported our church for four years as a missionary for *Q Place and coached countless* 

people in facilitating nonjudgmental groups where faith discussions often open the door to a relationship with Jesus. Jan coached Melissa Lade, Shannu Snyder and Linda Lyke in facilitating their Q Place group and the

current Grow Group on Sabbath morning – the 9 Arts of Spiritual Conversations, Primer. Read the bio that Jan shared with us, below... I grew up in central Illinois, lived in Wheaton, IL, for 30 years, and now live in Fort Wayne, Indiana. I met my husband, Dave, at Wheaton College and married in 1974. I have a bachelor's in nursing and worked as a nurse for 13 years. Dave and I enjoyed raising our three children in Wheaton, IL. We are blessed with four grandchildren. They live in other states, so we often travel to visit them.

My Q Place story starts long before I came on staff. Over 25 years ago while my kids were growing up, I used to meet one on one with neighbors. I would help them in their understanding of God, and many times those conversations led me to start a new Bible study for neighbors. In

> fact, during that time I started at least eight seeker Bible studies.

In 2001, I was the one seeking. I knew my spirit was stirred toward some kind of ministry, but I didn't know what God had in mind. And then one day while I was walking and praying, a Christian neighbor asked if I had heard of Neighborhood Bible Studies. I was immediately intrigued, and God

opened the door for me to become a field staff member of this ministry that is now called

O Place.

Looking back, I can see that God prepared me for this ministry over many years' time. As Ephesians 2:10 (NIV) savs,

"For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do."

I am thrilled that God has allowed me to help other Christians do exactly what I am so

passionate about - helping people come into a relationship with Christ through investigating God's Word. What a privilege!

In addition to my field staff work, I have continued to launch groups wherever God has led me - 17 groups and counting - with my tennis team, with office accountants, at church with people who are new to the Bible, and in many neighborhoods. I love working with people who are reading and discussing Scripture for the first time.

I also love coaching other Christians, pastors, and church staff to start groups like mine. Since 2016 my role with Q Place has expanded dramatically. I coach around

90 Christians each year, coordinate Q Place coaching groups, and train catalysts who are spreading the mission and vision of O Place to more Christians and churches. I also train pastors and church leaders in how to use our curriculum called the 9 Arts of Spiritual Conversations for the greatest impact. It's thrilling to think of multiplying the

number of Christians who are engaging with people around them like Jesus did - noticing, praying, listening, asking questions, loving, welcoming, facilitating, serving together, and sharing.



## Grief and Loss During the Covid Pandemic

Our current world situation is not one that we are accustomed to. The presence of a deadly disease has turned upside down the way we look

at situations and perform our daily lives. Trauma, defined as anything that changes our view of God,

tasks:



self, or others for the worse, is something that is happening to all of us to some degree. Another important aspect of this turmoil is a feeling of grief and loss which is different than the usual type. To help us deal with this, Dr. William Worden has developed a model for dealing with grief during the epidemic which includes four

Accept the reality of the

loss. This takes time especially with Covid. In this pandemic, losses are ongoing and may change daily. We don't have an end date. Every day we need to tell ourselves "this is what my life is right now and I have no control over it." It is helpful to admit you are struggling.

Explore and express all the difficult emotions involved with the

> losses. There is no right way to do this. Pause and ask yourself about your feelings. Disappointment is a common

one. Don't bury these emotions in an attempt to be strong. We are healthier when we allow ourselves to feel: talk to

> someone, iournal, take Amidst talk to Jesus.

> > Make the necessary adjustments

to find the new normal. This is hard because the normal keeps changing. We may need to create new relationships when the old are not possible. We may find we need to adjust to a new personal identity which comes with trial and error.

Develop an enduring connection to what we

have lost. Find meaning, hope and trust in Jesus. Ask "What is the tangible good? What do I need to accept about the reality of my losses? What difficult emotions has the pandemic elicited? What am I grateful for? What adjustments have I made? What changes am I resisting or still need to make? If you are not doing well, reach out to someone vou can trust who is safe.

In addition to adjustments to self, family and other relationships, spiritual adjustments need to be made. These may include corporate worship including the ability to attend church and how we connect to God. Who and what am I trusting in? We may feel a sense of injustice - Why, God? What is God saying through His Word? We need to walk by faith. It may be helpful to communicate with a pastor, write a letter to God or do a small group study through Zoom. Self-care is another essential part of this new normal. It is not selfish to take care of yourself. Give yourself permission to not be okay, give margins between activities and just be. You don't always have to be productive or be learning. Allow time for relaxation, meditation and leaning into God.

Resilience, the ability to bounce back, to be grounded, to seek support, is a trait every one of us needs to develop. If you find yourself becoming depressed or discouraged reach out to a friend, counselor or pastor. You are not alone. We need to help each other.


