The Poet, Samuel Johnson, wrote in a letter in 1762 that "Hope is itself a species of happiness, and, perhaps, the chief happiness which this world affords." 



Prayer Focus - Jesus' Worldwide Church

Would you believe this: There are 2 billion Christians in 200 countries – nearly a third of the world's population. Some have confused beliefs – about half are Roman Catholic and half various protestant denominations. Over 550 million identify as Evangelicals – those we believe hold most closely to Biblical truth. Christians are so widespread

that no single continent or region can claim to be the center of global Christianity. A century ago, this was not the case.

Then, two-

thirds of the world's Christians lived in Europe. Today, only about a quarter of all Christians live in Europe. More than a third are in the Americas. One in four Christians lives in Africa. One of eight is in Asia. Christ followers speak over 5,000 different languages!!!!

Jesus created and empowers His church to bring the good news of the gospel to the world and nothing can thwart His will – and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it (Matthew 16:18). Later He told his disciples "This gospel of the kingdom **will be** proclaimed throughout the whole world as a testimony to all nations, and then the end

will come" (Matthew 24:14).

Will be – not might be! Will be – without fail.

Throughout history, evil forces have been and are at work against the spread of the gospel. In 43 countries Christ followers face persecution; government opposition is obvious in China, North Korea and many Islamic states. Violence

breaks out in places like
Nigeria or Mozambique where
being Christian
can be a death
sentence. And in
western
nations like ours,
there is growing
social and government pressure to

compromise Biblical truth in the name of inclusiveness.

Yet the task will not fail. Church fellowships will multiply and grow worldwide – especially among the 2 billion "unreached" people who do not have anyone able to share the truth about Jesus in their language or in a way they can understand. Many have never met a Christian.

So! There is work to do! And we are called to be a part of it. This month our prayer focus is encouragement and strength for God's worldwide church – and for our fellowship's commitment to the global church. None of us can live as Christ followers and carry out His will

without the daily, sustaining power of the Holy Spirit which Jesus provides.

LORD, **keep us spiritually healthy** – as individuals, as local church fellowships, and as the global church. Convict us of sin! Let us live lives of repentance and obedience. Let us forgive as we have been forgiven. Fill us with the joy and peace that comes only from you.

LORD, **grant us unity**. As far as possible let us be at peace with others. Keep us faithful in praying for each other – particularly our brothers and sisters facing poverty and persecution. Let our love for one another reveal Jesus to the world!

LORD, keep us passionately in love with Jesus. Let His name be honored and glorified among us. Give us eyes to see, ears to hear and hearts to respond to the wonder of His sacrifice for us. Let us seek to know Him better each day. Give us opportunities to share what God is doing in our lives. Let us rejoice to be brothers and sisters in Christ.

LORD, **keep us from compromising Biblical truth.** Your word is truth. Jesus is the way, the truth, the life. Give us courage. Give us boldness and gentleness – let us not waver from the gospel Jesus taught

The 9 Arts of Spiritual Conversations

Give the Gospels a fresh look and notice how intentional Jesus was with individuals he encountered. In fact, he developed a reputation for spending time with outsiders. Preaching and proclamation were significant in his ministry, yet he spent the vast majority of his time on the road with

twelve men who were slowly coming to understand who Jesus was.

They were taught, but they also caught how Jesus made disciples.

They learned from him how to engage spiritual seekers and walk with them on the discipleship journey. So can Christians in the 21st century. So can churches. So can we!

THE 9 ARTS OF SPIRITUAL CONVERSATIONS

You can think of the nine arts in groups of three:

Getting Ready: Noticing, Praying,* Listening

Getting Started: Asking Questions, Loving, Welcoming **Keeping It Going:** Facilitating, Serving Together, Sharing



*Featured Art: The Art of Prayer By Melissa Lade

What is the Art of Prayer? Maybe I'll start out with what prayer is not! Prayer is not God answering my daily multiplechoice quizzes! For example, God, should I (A). Stay in this job (B). Accept this other job offer (C). Look for another job or (D). none of the above! It's like we are saying, Creator of the universe, here are Your choices, pick one! This sounds ridiculous but we do it all the time! Prayer is actually just talking to God. But it's also listening! Like in the example above, we can and should ask God for His wisdom, but then we need to take time and listen for God to speak to us. God gives us 24/7 direct access to Himself. Prayer allows us to develop our relationship with God. It shows that we trust and depend on Him.

To apply this to our everyday lives, we should look to Jesus as our example, because even He needed to pray! Jesus prayed daily and also when He faced trials, persecution, physical suffering, temptations and heartache. He prayed alone and with others. It is vital though that when we pray we believe God hears us and will answer our prayers in His wisdom. Just recently I prayed that God would give my family

negative Covid test results, but right after I prayed I started to talk about

what would happen if the results were positive. How foolish! What I should have done was prayed and then thanked God for listening and declared this truth in my mind and conversations.

An example of what this would look like: Just do it! Pray! But that can be easier said than done! There were so many times when Linda, Shanny and I would be leading a group and forget to pray. We actually decided to post notes on our computers and send text messages to each other to remind us to pray! Maybe that's something for us all to consider. Setting

> an alarm on our phone, signing up for a prayer app, getting a prayer partner, or scheduling prayer times during the day or week. Because we need prayer. The reality

is, without prayer, our attempts at anything, especially obeying the command to make disciples of all nations, will be a disaster. We are blessed to have a God who wants to have a relationship with us and prayer is one of the ways we get to know God!

World on Mission by Linda Lyke, Outreach Coordinator

In "World on Mission" each month I share a bit about what we learned in the *Perspectives on the World Christian Movement* class – because God calls ALL of us to have a part in His mission. What is His mission?

"God is on mission to be loved, served and worshiped by people from all humanity." (Perspectives Study Guide - PSG, pg. 4)
This month, I feature an example from our 9 Arts of Spiritual Conversation class, where the Arts intersect with the Perspectives course, as both look at The Great Commission vs. The Great Commandment.

"You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' This is the great and foremost commandment. The second is like it, You shall love your neighbor as yourself." -Matthew 22:37-39

"All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth. Go therefore and make disciples of all the nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and lo, I am with you al-

ways, even to the end of the age." -Matthew 28:18-20

Too often in the Church today, the "Great Commandment" (Matthew 22:37-39) is pitted against the "Great Commission" (Matthew 28:18-20). Some question why they should venture crossculturally overseas when there are people to love in their own backyard. Others emphasis our call to "go" to the nations seemingly at the cost of our ministry locally. Who is correct?

Steve Hawthorne in the Perspectives Reader (pg. 128-129) points out that both are of equal priority but are not equal in nature:

- -The Great Commandment is ongoing
- -The Great Commission is a task to be completed

Both are commanded but one will be completed at some point in history and the other will be ongoing throughout eternity. That means that we cannot approach each the same nor can we neglect one over the other.

However, both are similar in that both should be focused on God. The Great Commandment is loving God first and the Great Commission results in people following God as disciples. Pitting the two together can lead us to focus on human needs rather than God.

Hawthorne concludes by pointing out that both work togeth-

er. We cannot effectively make disciples without love for others and ultimately we desire to make disciples who love God and love others.

May both "Great's" continue to further the glory of our "Great" God.

Similarly, from our Fall Grow Group book, <u>Practicing the 9</u>
<u>Arts of Spiritual Conversations</u>
<u>Primer</u> (pg. 71):

Although the Great Commandment is not normally considered a passage relating to evangelism and the Great Commission, it is the starting point for sharing the good news about Jesus. In fact, loving God and loving others will galvanize our involvement in the Great Commission. If we strive to love others as God loves us, we can begin to build trusting friendships and earn the right to engage in spiritual conversations with people outside the church.

How true! When we show the love of Christ to those around us, we open doors to share the reason for the hope that we have.

Never cease to pray about your role in the Great Commission: Matt 28:19-20a Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you.

The Privilege of Sharing God by Zac Muench

Zac Muench is one of our church's missionaries. He's been working in Spain for nearly three years; before that we supported him in ministry in Puerto Rico, Peru and around the United States. We asked him to recap his call to missions and what he's been doing:

Zac's Testimony

Skateboarding has been an interest of mine for almost as long as I can remember. Most free time was spent trying to grind little rails that my dad made us. My brother Nathaniel and I grew up going to church every Saturday – we never questioned it – it was just what you did. We had a desire for people to know Jesus, so we started a skate ministry during our middle school years.

I always knew God existed and believed that Jesus died and rose again, but I didn't know how much of a deep intimate relationship I had with Him until much later.

"Following the rules" was something I did because I was afraid if I didn't, God would

stomp on me (or something like that). I did spend some time trying to know God, but the rule-following mentality made it difficult to open up. I believed that once you received Jesus you would somehow be immediately perfect and you would always feel love, joy, peace - you name it. I thought "If you believe, you're always supposed to feel the spiritual fruit." So, what could I do when I didn't? What does that imply? Am I saved even? These questions troubled me deeply. By the time I was 19, I was pushing God to the back burner, believing that "He was out to get me." After all, I genuinely tried my best.

Right around my 21st birthday, some friends started encouraging me with words they felt God wanted to tell me. "You are enough – because Jesus is enough. It's not up to you." for example. I never saw this side of God before. My brother suggested I do a sixmonth-long Bible school, so I decided I'd give God one last chance.

During one of the first weeks of the school, a friend prayed with me to recommit my life to God. I still wrestled with allowing myself to be seen just as I am, with being honest with God instead of trying to earn His love. Still my mind would repeat "Now that you've accepted Jesus, you're supposed to always feel joy, and know you're saved, and feel like you're saved."

God began speaking to me and bringing me gently and lovingly, deeper and deeper into a

relationship with Him. Reassuring me and helping me understand the completeness of Christ's work.

After the school, I felt led to go on staff with Youth With A Mission in Barcelona, Spain. God continues to give me a deeper and deeper community; since being here He has been revealing His true heart for me.

While staffing one of the sixmonth-long skateboarding Bible schools in 2018, I remember being 4 1/2 months through the school and being exhausted. Here I was, on staff, and I was worn to a frazzle. During my break, I started walking down a little road for a couple of miles until I came to a creek with a bridge. Sitting on the bridge, I poured my heart out to God with tears and shared my deepest fears, insecurities, disappointment, and frustrations. I didn't feel like His son. In fact, I felt like He abandoned me. But sitting there, enjoying staring at the trickling water, I felt Him say, "the same way you delight in that, I delight in you. I am pleased with you."

Walking away I was really encouraged. But doubts arose – "what if it's just in my head?" The next day a friend gave me

a note with an encouragement she felt like God put on her heart to share. At the very end of the note it said, "In spite of the disappointments and frustrations, God is pleased with you. He delights in you and He is mighty to save." Her words were the same ones I'd "heard" – but the crazy part is I'd never told anyone what God said to me.

God has shown me that He won't reject me for having certain feelings. Regardless of how good or corrupt they are, living a life pretending like they're not there is believing a lie. I always feared sharing with God when I wasn't feeling "saved" or like His son because I feared He would reject me. But over the past couple of years, and this year especially, He has revealed to me that it's okay to feel those things, He's already aware of them. His love never

fails. He has given me a passion to share this truth and joy with hurting people. God isn't as worried about what junk is in the basement, as much as He is that the light is turned on first to see it. Healing can only come when it is exposed.

This year has been one of the hardest years for me, as well as for

others in our ministry, but God revealed His loving character throughout it. He is my Father, He will never leave me, and He is faithful to redeem and restore the worst in me. And He gives me the privilege of sharing this with others.

What Zac is Doing on the Mission Field – and Why

Community is at the core of what I do. My desire is to love, disciple, and care for others through encouragement, hospitality/service, inclusion, and listening. I want people to know the love of the Father, the sacrifice of the Son and the power of the Spirit – there is restoration and safety in the Lord.

Skateboarders and artists are the people group I'm specifically focused on. Around the

world, these subcultures have many who have not heard clearly the gospel of Christ. I am on staff at Youth With a Mission (YWAM) in Barcelona, Spain. Why Barcelona? It is a mecca for skateboarders they come here from around the world. We reach out to the local skateboard community and to international skateboard "tourists". We also hold an annual school to train others to share the gospel, with a particular emphasis on action sports. The training includes theology, prayer and practical experience ministering to skateboarders. I've grown in my language skills (all our work is in Spanish), as well as my administrative and discipling skills during my time in Barcelona. Much of my time lately has been in one-on-one mentoring and discipleship.

The Latest News from Barcelona (and Germany)

YWAM Barcelona recently took on 2 new staff: Philip (originally from Germany) and Tamar (from Cataluna). They're 7 months pregnant so we're about to have a family here! They have a huge heart for worship and intercession which is something our base has been lacking.

Philip led worship for us a few days ago and it was one of the most encouraging worship times I've experienced since before the quarantine. There were a few of us from YWAM, the Calling All Skaters community, and a couple of new guys too. They are truly a blessing.

Friday nights are now Art Night at YWAM. We open up El Sótano, "the basement", and invite local artists to come and join our family of creatives. There is an opportunity to create and to talk about spiritual questions.

Monday mornings we go out to the favorite local skate locale and pray for the presence of the Holy Spirit and the skaters who will be arriving. We have opportunities to share the gospel and pray with people. We've been able to provide short-term housing for stranded skaters – and we've had the joy of seeing people get saved!

Our Youth With A Mission base needs to move – the quarantine and lockdown situation has reduced our income and we've reassessed our needs. We're praying for God to show us the perfect location.

And finally, I was able to go to Germany for two and half weeks for my brother Nathaniel's wedding. While there I reconnected with the international skate community Nathaniel has been pouring into for the past 4 years. We're all working together for the same goal, to make disciples of all nations.

We need to learn that it is okay to make mistakes, to have family problems, to struggle with anxiety or to fall into addiction and to ask for help with these problems. This does not mean we are failing at life; it means we are human. A recent study conducted by Barna Group in conjunction with Boone Center for the Family revealed that among both Christians and non-Christians interviewed 50% admit to at least one problem that impacts their relationships. The wide range of issues included marital problems, unwanted singleness, parenting, sexual intimacy, addiction, anxiety/depression, pornography and loneliness. Any of these can cause an ebbing satisfaction with relationships and as a result a ripple effect that reaches to all corners of our lives. It is not unusual for a person to struggle with more than one of these issues. When that happens, there is a world of hurt to contend with.

The current pandemic has added to relational problems in a big way. Loneliness has been amplified. People who live alone may go days without human contact. Even those who live with others may feel alone due to the upheaval caused by the new ways we must work and carry out our daily activities. When families are home together trying to work or do school in ways they are not

used to, relationships can deteriorate quickly. This fact can increase anxiety and other mental health problems. As usual methods of entertainment are denied, people turn to social media, the internet and television to fill their time often getting a skewed view of the world and increasing anxieties and depression.

A significant finding of this study shows that people who

address relationship concerns and mental health at church experience greater spiritual growth. Bearing one another's

other's burdens, it seems, does lighten the load. Never has there been a more important time for the church to talk about relationships. People need a church family and the grace Jesus offers in this age of anxiety. The church can and must be a reliable place to turn for relational restoration.

How do we as a church face these issues and help people solve their problems with relationships? People who interact on a spiritual level, whether through prayer, Bible study or some other activity, are more likely than those who don't to turn to each other during a personal crisis. There is some correlation between sharing spiritual interactions and having each other's backs. Many look to a family member or close friend for help. Practicing Christians are likely to turn to a pastor for relational support.

As a church we need to encourage our pastors to get the training they need to be able to counsel people effectively. We also need to insist that they refer people to professional counselors when their efforts to help have reached a roadblock. If there are professional mental health counselors

in the church they can be used in this ministry. Teaching openly and honestly from the pulpit can help people understand the Bible's teaching on problems they are encountering. Encouraging classes on relational and mental health issues so people have a platform to discuss them can be helpful.

In addition, it is vitally important that the pastor has support as he or she counsels others. As a church we can

make sure that they have adequate time to solidify their own relationships with their family, friends and cohorts. Pastors need to wrestle with God about these problems, have time to process and have a trusted friend to talk things over with. This applies to youth leaders as well. Knowing how to build sol-

id relationships starts well before adulthood.

This study's findings strongly suggest that churches help people live better relational lives. It also shows that professional counseling and mental healthcare play a vital role in helping people heal. God is us-

ing these to restore broken people and relationships. That is good news! Let's employ all of the above when it comes to restoring relationships – and rejoice to see the gospel come alive in everyday life!
