

These are our four missionaries:

*Larry Schultz:* Larry ministers locally to High School students through Bible studies, lunch time faith discussions

during the school week, and in <u>Koinonia</u> <u>Singers</u>, a gospel touring group with a show choir flair.



**Nathaniel Muench:** In 2008 Nathaniel and his brother Zac started <u>Skaters of Christ Skateboard Ministry</u>. He was only a young teen at the time and didn't even know much about skateboarding. Since that time he and his crew have gone all over the world sharing the good news of Christ. He is currently reaching

out to skaters in Europe and is based in Berlin, Germany. Because of the refugee crisis, he has in-



creasing opportunities to reach out using skateboarding as a bridge to the hearts of young refugees.

Zac Muench: In 2008 Zac and his brother, Nathaniel started <u>Skaters of</u> <u>Christ Skate-</u> <u>board Ministry</u>. He has been



many places in the world, sharing the love of Jesus through skateboard ministry. He is currently reaching out to skaters in Europe and is based in Barcelona, Spain. He is working with Youth With a Mission in training new leaders and also with the "Calling All Skater's Program. **Jan Teat:** has been on staff with <u>Q Place</u> since 2001. She has experienced the joy of starting many Q Place groups, seeing firsthand how God changes lives when people are able to

discuss questions about life, God, and the Bible in a safe environment. Serving on the leadership team as National Field Director, Jan loves coaching Christians to start groups like



hers. She also trains pastors and church leaders to use Q Place's 9 Arts of Spiritual Conversations curriculum for the greatest impact, so that many more Christians are engaging with people around them like Jesus did. Jan and Dave have three grown children and four grandchildren and live in Fort Wayne, Indiana.

#### World on Mission by Linda Lyke, Outreach Coordinator

In "World on Mission" each month I share a bit about what we learned in the Perspectives on the World Chris-



tian Movement class – because God calls ALL of us to have a part in his mission. What is His mission?

> "God is on mission to be loved, served and worshiped by people from all humanity." (Perspectives Study Guide - PSG, pg 4)

In our Perspectives course, I learned the difference between first and third world poverty. One way to understand the difference is to look at relative versus absolute poverty:

#### **Relative poverty:**

describes a situation in which people are on the margins of society. One person's standard of living is compared to another person's standard of living. In North America, a family may be considered poor if they don't have their own telephone, have no car or obtain food using food stamps. However a family in India who does not have a car or telephone may not be considered poor at all. If neither family is suffering from an absolute lack of food, shelter or clothing, then their poverty is a "relative poverty." **Absolute poverty:** 

situations where people have an absolute insufficiency to meet the basic needs of life.

describes

Compare some of the poorest people in North America with the poorest of Calcutta. Questions to think about: How would you categorize most of the poverty of North America – absolute or relative poverty? Why does the distinction matter?

It can be misleading to think of poverty as a problem that can be eliminated by economic solutions. A better view of poverty is to think of it as a deficit and what causes the "lack."

#### **Broken relationships:**

are at the root of the ills and grief of the poor, the Bible explains. This perspective helps us understand the history of poverty and the complexity.

**Misused power:** can be at the foundation of those who live in poverty. "Examining the plight of the poor communities often reveals some kind of exploitation."\* **Fear:** is the opposite of faith, so fear is a spiritual problem. When we fear, we are impoverished. This can be true of anyone, but very often those in impoverished situations, because they can be afraid of those who have influence over their future and well being. In some cultures there is fear of the spirit world, the unseen world of demons, spirits and ancestors.

#### Poverty is essentially a spir-

**itual issue.** "Only the gospel – all of it – contains the hope that the poor will be enabled to live in communities where relationships are restored, abusive power is broken and fears are allayed."\*

That's what we as Christ followers do. When missionaries go into communities of poverty, they bring Christ's transforming eternal work with them. The most powerful of which is the transformational work of the heart, to know and love Jesus forever.

Never cease to pray about your role in the Great Commission: Matt 28:19-20a *Therefore go* 

> and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you.

## The 9 Arts of Spiritual Conversations

Jesus as well as His disciples, were intentional in engaging spiritual seekers and walking with them on the discipleship journey. Using Jesus' example, these 9 Arts open doors for drawing spiritual seekers to Christ.

You can think of the nine arts in groups of three: Getting Ready: Noticing, Praying, Listening Getting Started: Asking Questions, Loving, Welcoming Keeping It Going: Facilitating,\* Serving Together, Sharing



## \*Featured Art: The Art of Facilitating by Shanny Snyder

What a big, intimidating word. Yet, if you break it down from its Latin origin, it means "to make easy". Hmm. That sounds less scary already. Facilitating a group in terms of a Bible study is the act of asking thought provoking questions, waiting AND praying in the silence that will typically follow right after asking the question, guiding your members through the material and, most importantly, being present in the study with the people you're ministering to. Yes, it's quite a lot! But this can be done! Leaning on the presence and guidance of the Holy Spirit is something that has never failed because He wants to be invited into a time with meaning and intentionality. After all, it is His inspired Word that we're digging into!

Preparing for a lesson and making the lesson applicable and memorable are also high on the priority list of making a Bible study stick in the mind's of the people who will be following your lead. It is your choice if you're going to enter that time stressed, bored or expectant to take away something you'll learn along with the group.

You don't have to be an expert on the material, but having some basic knowledge of the material you're going to present never hurt a study or hindered the facilitator in the process... that I know of. You bring yourself and your talents to the people around you in the group. Often that includes a bit of humor and a couple mistakes. But most of the members will come back even with a few hiccups! It's good for people to see that you are indeed human as they are human.

Having a professional yet relaxed approach to the folks in your meeting typically serves a Bible study quite nicely. When you set up a Bible study, you'll want to begin and end on time, have set guidelines in place and present them to new members when they join, God willing, and begin with prayer inside your heart. Jesus likes to hear from us! Remember, nervousness is normal. The gospel is a big deal! But we have a Helper who aids us in planting the seeds in our hearer's hearts. Be bold! Be brave! And be in love with Jesus so much that you actually tell people about Him in an excited way!

Example: If you see someone on a zoom call lean in as someone asks a question or states a fact, take that as an invitation to ask them what pricked their interest. Chances are, they subconsciously wanted to be asked but weren't quite brave enough to speak up but YOU noticed! Be prepared to be blown away by the thoughts and questions new believers or "not yet" believers have. You don't want to miss them! You know what, they don't want to be missed either so as you're facilitating, keep an eye out for the movers in your next zoom call!

## Learn from the participants in the 9 Arts Grow Group

Some participants in the 9 Arts Grow Group last fall wrote about the impact of the class.

Patty Peterson shares how various arts, including the Art of Listening and Asking Questions, opened doors of conversation between sisters at a crucial time:

I like to think of myself as a good listener because I give people all the time they want to talk. But, when I was asked to assess my Listening skill level from 1 to 5 in the 9 Arts Primer, the description included "without editorializing or offering my own unsolicited opinions." Ouch. Then, the Art of Asking Questions gave me a way to use questions instead of statements to solicit more information and help a person think more deeply.

I recently traveled a thousand miles to visit my sister in the hospital before she died. She mentioned that she was feeling afraid. With my new 9 Arts awareness, instead of saying, "There's nothing to be afraid of" or "Just take it to God in prayer", I asked what her fears were and learned she was afraid of dying alone. That was an important piece of information for others in the room because they were able to arrange for her to return home for her final few days where her husband could be with her in person.

## GIFTS Shelter News by Beau Gilmore

I would like to thank all those who either supplied food or their time to the GIFTS shelter in April. It was really great to finally get back into the shelter and serve. This continues to show our support in God's work for the homeless men. They appreciation the quality meals and talk about how good they are! They don't always get the quality meals that we provide. A huge thanks to Pam Adams for her cooking. I will be scheduling our next week for early October.

There are 15 men living at the shelter right now, with attempts to get to 21 in the next several weeks. COVID has limited our ability to serve the men with the programs we have had in the past. I have just returned to lead the Wednesday morning devotions after they had been canceled last year as a result of a major change in the leadership of GIFTS. GIFTS is now in search of a new director and returning on the old format.

The GIFTS thrift store is up and running very well. They are looking for volunteers for several positions. If you would like to volunteer please contact me or the store. If you have items to donate you can drop them off at the store, not at the shelter. The store is located in the old Black Bridge Bowl building (1141 Black Bridge Road, Janesville.)

Summer Items: children's t-shirts (plain, no writing), smaller flip flops, small slip-on sandals, smaller balls, uninflated soccer balls & pumps, jump ropes, summer toys, sunglasses, hats / ball caps WOW Items (fun special gifts): small cars, small dolls, small stuffed



animals, small toys (puppets, trucks, small etch-a-sketch), kazoos / harmonica, yo-yos / Slinkys, small Lego kits, play doh, small games, toys that light up or make noise (with extra batteries), flashlights, musical instruments, playing cards, glow sticks

Our church's 281 boxes, packed in November of 2020, were shipped to Georgia, a former Soviet republic in Eastern Europe. It's on the Black Sea, borders Turkey, Russia and Armenia.

## Operation Christmas Child by Julianna Crandall

Julianna Crandall wrote this article for the Milton High School December 2020 issue of their paper, MHS Today. Even though it's May, it's never a wrong time to think about organizing and purchasing for Operation Christmas Child!

As the holidays draw near, many people are scrambling to find the perfect gifts for dear friends and family. However, over at the Milton Seventh Day Baptist church, they have been preparing for holiday gift giving for months.

Starting in September, a committee headed by Linda Lyke, outreach coordinator at Milton SDB, put their heads together to plan this year's Operation Christmas Child (OCC) packing party. This yearly event consists of adults and children alike coming together to stuff shoeboxes full of necessities and toys for children in need. These shoeboxes are then shipped all around the world for children to open as a very special Christmas present. Something like a shoebox seems so simple, but has a big impact.

OCC's mission is to "spread Jesus' love and the Gospel message around the world starting with a simple shoebox," Lyke said. She has been in charge of coordinating Milton SDB's event for four years, and continues to do so because "it reaches people locally within our own church, in our community. We invite churches to participate, we invite businesses to participate. It's a collaborative effort of people in the community."

One Milton SDB church goer and MHS junior, Genna Mullen, has been participating in OCC for as long as she can remember. "My favorite part about OCC is the joy I get from packing the boxes; knowing that the kids who receive them are going to be so happy for something as simple as a toothbrush, toothpaste, and a small toy," Mullen said. She encourages community members to participate in this project or others as a "good re-

minder of how fortunate we are to have what we have." Mullen is just one volunteer out of the many who attend packing parties, but there are also those on the OCC committee.

Lyke is in charge of delegating tasks to her committee members and making sure they all pull together. Just a few of these roles include a shopper to find good deals on items to give the kids, an item coordinator to put these items together in an orderly fashion, a marketer to spread the word, and a community coordinator to bring people together for the event.

The collaborative element in OCC can involve people of all ages and backgrounds, as the youngest member on the OCC committee, Ellie Greene, is just 12 years old. *"Ellie came* onto the first zoom meeting and right away she started offering ideas," said Lyke, sounding very proud. Greene serves as the community coordinator, sending letters and emails to various churches and businesses to get them involved.

While quite festive, this community involvement doesn't end with the holiday season. *"Ellie and I are talking about things that she can do through the year to reach out to community members,"* Lyke said. Her hope for the future is *"reaching out in new ways to our community. Throughout the* 



year, having them collaborate with us, and then through the packing party."

Lyke encourages community members to donate items – not just during the holiday season, but year round-to OCC. Items such as hygiene products, school supplies, and fun toys make a big difference in the lives of the children who receive the shoeboxes.

Last year, OCC shipped shoeboxes to 10.5 million children in over 100 countries. Lyke said, *"I love that they're hitting countries that have never heard the Gospel before. That's a beautiful part of the project."* 

The true mission of the project is to share the Gospel of Jesus Christ. The kids who receive a shoebox are also given the opportunity to attend a discipleship class.

*"It's not just a shoebox, it's a discipleship program,"* Lyke said. According to the OCC website, more than 11.2 million boys and girls have made a decision to follow Christ.

The organization and program also hope to create community in the areas they serve. *"Local Christians who know the culture and language best*  are given effective resources and a solid Biblical foundation so that they can communicate the Gospel within their own communities," reads the OCC website.

Even for the volunteers involved at any point in the process, this project is lifechanging. "People who come into our church and also our church members can be exposed to the Gospel through a community of believers doing this project together," said Lyke.

Lyke's message for anyone wanting to be involved in this project or a similar one is to "find a project you're passionate about and use your talents to help, even if it's in a simple way. And the important thing is to stick with it! Because everyone has unique talents and gifts that they can use to help."
